Clarksville Police and Fire were dispatched, along with Montgomery County EMS in early April 2009 for a small child that was choking. The crew arrived on the scene to find a two year old child unresponsive and not breathing. Air was unable to enter Mikaya's lungs due to a popcorn kernel that could not be dislodged. They quickly thought of another solution and a tube was inserted to push the popcorn down and get air into her lungs. The child was taken to Gateway Medical Center and was later transferred to Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt by the Montgomery County EMS and Vanderbilt Lifeflight members. Mikaya Trice is now a thriving three year old.
