Around lunchtime on August 4, Putnam County EMS received a call about a semiconscious man, followed by another call stating that the man had lost consciousness. When they arrived, they found a bystander performing CPR on Phillip Maxwell. After shocking his heart three times, a rhythm was established and he was transported to Cookeville Regional Medical Center. The defibrillator that was implanted there saved his life again while he was in hospital care by correcting another cardiac arrest. Mr. Maxwell passes away on 10, 2011, but his two daughters—Diane Phy and Leslie Hill—say that they are indebted to Putnam County EMS for giving them an extra seven months to spend with their father and will represent his memory at the ceremony.
